Title:

Call for hearing(s) on use of best practices and legal or legislative measures needed to support Minority-Owned Business Enterprises

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the City of Chicago has a vested interest in the continued development and growth of Minority and Women owned Business Enterprises, that interest being codified in 2-92-650 of the Municipal Code of Chicago as amended to be in compliance with the decision in *Builders Ass'n of Greater Chicago v. City of Chicago*, (298 F. Supp. 2d 725 (N.D. Ill. 2003) and adopted by Chicago City Council in May 2004;

WHEREAS, the stated intent of the ordinance of the City of Chicago is to provide a level playing field and equal access for all contractors and subcontractors to participate in city contracting opportunities;

WHEREAS, recent studies conducted at the City and County levels conclude that discrimination based on gender and race, notably in the Construction industry, is still problematic and M/WBEs continue to struggle for business with less success than their white counterparts due to discriminatory practices;

WHEREAS, the number of MBEs in the city is still drastically lower than that of non-MBE companies;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Mayor and the members of City Council call for hearings before the Committee on Workforce Development to consider:

- Best practices for removing obstacles to the economy and marketplace for MBEs;
- What legal and legislative steps can be taken to strengthen and further the success of current MBEs; and
- How net worth caps on MBEs prevents meaningful growth and access to MBEs, causing significant economic and social harm to not only black communities, but Chicago at large.
